



First Reading Acts 11:1-18

Tow the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of Cod School B. also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

We acclaim you, holy God, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Holy God, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, Jesus lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose Jesus gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for Christ who died and rose for us, you sent the Holy Spirit, your own first gift for those who believe, to complete your work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Presider is to hold it or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

When the hour had come for Jesus to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Almighty God, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and descent among the dead, proclaiming Christ's resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting Christ's coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

Remember, Lord, your one holy catholic and apostolic Church, redeemed by the blood of your Christ. Reveal its unity, guard its faith, and preserve it in peace.

Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light.

And grant that we may find our inheritance with [the Blessed Virgin Mary, with matriarchs, patriarchs, prophets, apostles, and martyrs, (with _____) and] all the saints who have found favor with you in ages past. We praise you in union with them and give you glory through Jesus Christ our Savior.





Invitation to Holy Communion


The sacrament of Holy Communion is central to the Christian community. As Christ gave freely of himself, so the sacred meal in his name is also freely given. Rejoicing in the spirit of Christ's inclusive love, all are warmly invited to receive the bread and wine at the Supper of the Lord.


Following the direction of the ushers, come forward to the communion rail, where you may kneel or stand. If you wish to receive a blessing rather than communion, please indicate that desire by crossing your arms over your chest.

To receive the bread, your right palm on top of your left palm. *Gluten-free wafers are available*. Please assist us by crossing your right arm over your chest so we may serve you correctly. To receive the wine, please help guide the chalice to your lips. If you do not receive wine, you may touch the chalice when it is offered, or simply cross both arms after receiving the bread.


Due to our Diocesan health policy, we ask you not to dip your communion bread into the chalice (i.e., intinction). If you are not comfortable drinking directly from the chalice, you are welcome to receive just the bread; or you may touch the chalice when it comes to you.


If you are unable to come to the altar rail, notify an usher, and we will bring communion to you.

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Notes on the service for the Fifth Sunday of Easter

The collect, composed for the 1549 Prayer Book, calls Christ the way, the truth, and the life, as Jesus will describe himself eight verses after today's Gospel passage. **The Way's extension to all humanity** is a theme of the readings.

After Peter had revived Dorcas of Joppa, as reported last Sunday, he had a vision of being commanded to eat foods which were not kosher. Meanwhile in nearby Caesarea, a Roman centurion, Cornelius, had also had a vision. Cornelius was commanded to send to Joppa for a man called Peter. When the two met in the centurion's house, Peter grasped that God intended him to preach to this God-fearing Gentile's household. When he did, the Holy Spirit entered them in an event which turned into a "Gentile Pentecost." Cornelius and his household were forthwith baptized, the first non-Jews recorded to have joined the Christian movement. A centurion was a member of the Roman establishment, not one of the oppressed.

Departures from approved Jewish practice, such as entering a Gentile's house and eating non-kosher foods, neither of which Jesus was ever reported having done, caused repercussions. Today's first reading is Acts' account of Peter's defense of his actions before the conservative Jewish Christian leaders in Jerusalem. Their concurrence to Peter's actions and to Paul's evangelization of Gentiles, an instance of which will be read next Sunday, would legitimate the Way's eventual transformation into a universal religion.

"Kings of the earth and all peoples, princes and all rulers of the world ... praise the Name of the LORD...." exhorts Ps. 148:11. Cornelius the centurion might be counted as a ruler among the peoples, *i.e.*, Gentiles, who praise God with "the children of Israel, a people who are near him," v 14. In the new heaven and earth Gentiles and Jews alike engage in that praise.

After death and hell have been cast into the lake of fire, in the penultimate scene of Revelation, John sees the holy city Jerusalem coming. There, all suffering is done away, and all thirst is slaked by the Alpha and Omega.

Today's Gospel is excerpted from a soliloquy by Jesus at the Last Supper. When Judas has left, Jesus declares that now he is about to be glorified. Jesus' "glorification," as John's Gospel understands it, is his suffering. Where Jesus is about to go, he says, his

disciples cannot yet follow. In the context of the Last Supper, Jesus means that they cannot follow him to crucifixion at that time. However, used devotionally, as today, "not yet follow" means the disciples must remain behind when the risen Jesus ascends. Christ's glory will remain behind for all in the disciples' love.

Commemorated on May 20 will be Alcuin, Deacon and Abbot of Tours, who served as Charlemagne's advisor and administrator. He died in 804.

From Father Paul

Dear Ones,

I am looking forward to being back with you this weekend. Many thanks to Fr. Steve Weissman for making a Sunday off possible, for Fr. Kevin McGrane for making the trip up to St. Louis this past Sunday as part of our Companion Parish swap day and, of course, to The Venerable Harry Leip for keeping the wheels on the bus! I had a lovely weekend off (although it's always a little strange), and a splendid time this past week in St. James with the people of Trinity. It's a very different setting, but they are a community that is equally as joyful and vibrant as we are here. I look forward to our communities getting to know each other better.

In last Sunday's gospel lesson, we hear Jesus say, "my sheep know my voice." In these days, there are many voices competing for our attention. Some find their origin in the Good Shepherd; others are echoes of the imposter. In light of this, I want to lift up the voice of the Presiding Bishop, The Most Rev. Sean T. Rowe. You may have seen in the news this week the announcement that The Episcopal Church will be ending our refugee resettlement grant agreements with the U.S. federal government. There's a link to Bp. Rowe's full letter below, but here is a pertinent paragraph.

"It has been painful to watch one group of refugees, selected in a highly unusual manner [i.e., white Afrikaners from South Africa whom the U.S. government has classified as refugees], receive preferential treatment over many others who have been waiting in refugee camps or dangerous conditions for years. I am saddened and ashamed that many of the refugees who are being denied entrance to the United States are brave people who worked alongside our military in Iraq and Afghanistan and now face danger at home because of their service to our country. I also grieve that victims

of religious persecution, including Christians, have not been granted refuge in recent months."
