First Reading

Genesis 22:1-14

God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the LORD called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The LORD will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the LORD it shall be provided."

For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Notes on the service for June 28, 2026, the Fifth Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 8

Eve of St. Peter and St. Paul, Apostles & Martyrs

In describing the church as built “upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets” this Sunday’s collect alludes to St. Peter and St. Paul the Apostles, whose feast will be June 29.

Last Sunday’s first reading was the terrifying tale of the near-death of Abraham’s first son, Ishmael in the wilderness in the sight of his mother. Today’s is the more terrifying tale of the near-death of Abraham’s second son (although God calls him his “only son”) Isaac on a mountain in the sight, and by the hand, of his father. In each episode, at the last minute, God intervenes and saves the lad. The narrator’s spare style heightens the stories’ dread.

Psychoanalytically-inclined interpreters have mined the near-sacrifice of Isaac and the abandonment of Ishmael for subconscious fears and archetypes. They observe that a child’s worst terror is that the parent who is supposed to provide for him and protect him will abandon him or kill him. Various theological commentators have read the story as a test of Isaac’s fortitude (Josephus); as a prefiguring of Christ’s crucifixion (Augustine); as a trial of Abraham’s faith (Kierkegaard). Following James Frazier, some anthropologists see it as a drama about the discontinuation of child sacrifice.

Child sacrifice was not rare in the ancient Near East. The Hebrew Bible mentions it more than a few times. In 8th century Moab, a Canaanite king was said to have saved his besieged city by sacrificing his son on the city wall. (II Kings 3:27) In 736 B.C., Israel’s King Ahaz sacrificed his eldest son. In 635, Judah’s reforming King Josiah prohibited the practice. (II Kings 23:10), and the authors of Deuteronomy claimed that God forbade it at Sinai. (Deut. 12:31). However, it must not have been stopped altogether, for the Prophets Jeremiah and Ezekiel were still denouncing it at the time of the Exile, 580’s B.C. Many scholars date the writing-down of Genesis 22 by an Elohist author between the reign of Ahaz and the reign of Josiah, so this passage about the God of Abraham substituting a lamb for the victim must have seemed especially relevant during the reformers’ campaign to outlaw child-sacrifice.

Important as Abraham is said to be, only one psalm, Ps.105, discusses him. In today’s Psalm 13:1-4 is a cry of distress, such as someone in Isaac’s situation, but having more leisure than Isaac, might think. At the end, the psalmist’s mood oscillates from desperation to faith. **God will intervene**, he assures himself.

Paul observes that human beings must be either slaves of sin or slaves of God. The former are on their way to death, the latter on their way to resurrection. Then Paul examines the argument that because we are under grace, not law, we may do whatever we wish. "Antinomianism" is the term for the heresy which claimed that because Christians were free of the law, they were allowed to do even things which are immoral under conventional ethics. No, slaves of righteousness would not behave unrighteously, is Paul's rebuttal.

Following Jesus' injunctions about the high cost of discipleship and the likelihood of persecution which formed the Gospels of the last two Sundays, we read today the end of Matthew 10, promising that whoever gives a prophet or a righteous person even a drink of water will be rewarded. Those charitable people are, like Peter and Paul, parts of the "holy temple" to which today's collect refers.

From Father Paul

Today is the feast of the Birth of John the Baptist. A hymn by the Venerable Bede (d. 735) begins

The great forerunner of the morn, / the herald of the Word, is born;
and faithful hearts shall never fail / with thanks and praise his light to hail.

Falling as it does just at midsummer when, in the Northern Hemisphere, the days are longest, St. John's Day has long been considered as one of the great "charmed" festivals of the liturgical year. In Europe, "Saint John's fires" are lit on mountains and hilltops. Other St. John's customs find their origin in pre-Christian solstice celebration.

For a little light midsummer fun, I thought I'd get my medieval music geek on. Did you know there is a direct connection between an 8th century hymn and a Broadway musical? It's true! The hymn, *Ut queant laxis*, is most famous because a guy called Guido of Arezzo noticed that it was useful for teaching singing because of the way it uses the notes of the scale. Each phrase begins on a successfully higher note – ut, re, mi, fa, sol, la. You can hear the hymn here:

Trinity Episcopal CWE Vestry Meeting Summary – May 19, 2026

The Vestry of Trinity Episcopal CWE met on May 19, 2026, opening with prayer and approving the April meeting minutes unanimously. Leadership reports highlighted both pastoral and operational updates, including reflections on immigration challenges shared by Bishop Deon, progress on facilities work such as the North Parish Hall roof repair, and steps toward establishing a clear and practical protocol for potential ICE interactions on church property. Financially, the parish received a clean audit, and the Vestry approved a thoughtful reallocation of several designated funds to better align with current ministries, including support for liturgical needs, local partners like Bikeworks, and ongoing health and youth initiatives through Trinity Food Ministry (TFM).

Ongoing business included continued development of an ICE response protocol, with plans for signage, multilingual informational cards, and a parish training in July, as well as progress on a collaborative TFM outreach mapping project to better coordinate food resources in the surrounding community. The Vestry also discussed Safe Church compliance, upcoming parish events, and Fr. Paul's scheduled time off. In new business, Adrienne Fly stepped down as Senior Warden after many years of Vestry service, with Perry Trolard appointed to the role. The meeting concluded with announcements of upcoming services and community activities, including Pentecost celebrations and participation in Wear Orange Sunday for gun violence awareness.

A special thanks to the Trinity Church Community for allowing Hope Education use of the North Parish Hall and the church library during the month of July for the **Hope Education Summer Reading Clinic**.

Hope Education is a small not-for-profit organization that tutors dyslexic students. During the school year it uses two classrooms at

Columbia School to identify dyslexic students and tutor them in reading, spelling and writing using in-person and on-line volunteer tutors. Columbia School is located on St. Louis Avenue near North Grand. The children learn to read and avoid some of the most negative self-images that haunt folks who need this service but cannot afford it.

The Hope Education Summer Reading Clinic has two purposes: to train classroom teachers in the basic literacy methods that enable dyslexic students to succeed; and to provide dyslexic students with intensive literacy tutoring.

The program will take place on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. There will be six adults and approximately ten students in each of two sessions: morning and afternoon. Students benefit greatly and learn to focus on the letters and words when the tutoring takes place in quiet spaces with no/minimal interruptions. Thus, Hope Education will use the nursery room, church school classroom and library for individual/small group work, in addition to the North Parish Hall.

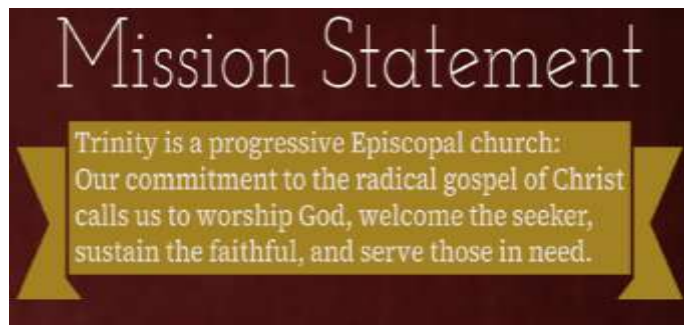
