



The Collect of the Day

Celebrant May God be with you People And also with you.

Celebrant Let us pray.

O God, the protector of all who trust in you, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy: Increase and multiply upon us your mercy; that, with you as our ruler and guide, we may so pass through things temporal, that we lose not the things eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

First Reading Genesis 18:20-32

The LORD said to Abraham, "How great is the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah and how very grave their sin! I must go down and see whether they have done altogether according to the outcry that has come to me; and if not, I will know."

So the men turned from there, and went toward Sodom, while Abraham remained standing before the LORD. Then Abraham came near and said, "Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city; will you then sweep away the place and not forgive it for the fifty righteous who are in it? Far be it from you to do such a thing, to slay the righteous with the wicked, so that the righteous fare as the wicked! Far be that from you! Shall not the Judge of all the earth do what is just?" And the LORD said, "If I find at Sodom fifty righteous in the city, I will forgive the whole place for their sake." Abraham answered, "Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord, I who am but dust and ashes. Suppose five of the fifty righteous are lacking? Will you destroy the whole city for lack of five?" And he said, "I will not destroy it if I find forty-five there." Again he spoke to him, "Suppose forty are found there." He answered, "For the sake of forty I will not do it." Then he

said, "Oh do not let the Lord be angry if I speak. Suppose thirty are found there." He answered, "I will not do it, if I find thirty there." He said, "Let me take it upon myself to speak to the Lord. Suppose twenty are found there." He answered, "For the sake of twenty I will not destroy it." Then he said, "Oh do not let the Lord be angry if I speak just once more. Suppose ten are found there." He answered, "For the sake of ten I will not destroy it."

Second Reading Colossians 2:6-19

A s you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving.

See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.

Therefore do not let anyone condemn you in matters of food and drink or of observing festivals, new moons, or sabbaths. These are only a shadow of what is to come, but the substance belongs to Christ. Do not let anyone disqualify you, insisting on self-abasement and worship of angels, dwelling on visions, puffed up without cause by a human way of thinking, and not holding fast to the head, from whom the whole body, nourished and held together by its ligaments and sinews, grows with a growth that is from God.



Luke 11:1-13

People Glory to you, Lord Christ

Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." He said to them, "When you pray, say:

- Father, hallowed be your name.
- Your kingdom come.





Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."







Communion of the People

Invitation to Holy Communion

The sacrament of Holy Communion is central to the Christian community. As Christ gave freely of himself, so the sacred meal in his name is also freely given. Rejoicing in the spirit of Christ's inclusive love, all are warmly invited to receive the bread and wine at the Supper of the Lord.

Following the direction of the ushers, come forward to the communion rail, where you may kneel or stand. If you wish to receive a blessing rather than communion, please indicate that desire by crossing your arms over your chest.

To receive the bread, your right palm on top of your left palm. *Gluten-free wafers are available*. Please assist us by crossing your right arm over your chest so we may serve you correctly. To receive the wine, please help guide the chalice to your lips. If you do not receive wine, you may touch the chalice when it is offered, or simply cross both arms after receiving the bread.

Due to our Diocesan health policy, we ask you not to dip your communion bread into the chalice (i.e., intinction). If you are not comfortable drinking directly from the chalice, you are welcome to receive just the bread; or you may touch the chalice when it comes to you.


If you are unable to come to the altar rail, notify an usher, and we will bring communion to you.



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Notes on the Service for the Seventh Sunday after Pentecost

Trusting in God is a major theme of today's propers. "When I called, you [God] answered me," testifies today's psalm. Today's first reading and Gospel provide other instances of reliance on God's reliability. Likewise, today's collect addresses God as the "protector of all that trust in thee." The collect also says that without God "nothing is strong, nothing is holy," a condition today's epistle applies to pagans "who were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh...," but were then made alive in Christ.

Today's lesson from Genesis takes up just six verses from the end of last Sunday's lesson. Abraham, in a show of *chutzpa*, bargains with the Lord, eventually persuading God to spare Sodom for the sake of as few as ten innocent inhabitants. The assumption behind this story is *collective guilt*, the belief that if one resident of a town or one member of a clan sins, then the whole town or clan is guilty of that one's misdeed. Abraham is posing the converse case, *i.e.*, if a few virtuous residents can save their entire city. Not until centuries after the authors of Genesis 18 did Israelites move toward the idea of *individual* rather than collective guilt. Then the prophets Ezekiel and Jeremiah taught that only "the soul that sins, it shall die." Yet a third view will appear

next Sunday, the view of Ecclesiastes that time and chance happen to the guilty and the innocent alike, regardless of merit.

Like the first reading, Psalm 138 is an example of trusting prayer. Verse 1 which our Prayer Book translates "before the gods I will sing your praise," as if the psalmist is praising the LORD despite of or in the face of other gods, has also been translated, I "will sing a hymn to You before the divine beings," as if the LORD is attended by supernatural beings such as seraphim.

Colossians is reminding Gentile-born readers that they have been "spiritually circumcised," *i.e.*, made spiritual descendants of Abraham and Sarah by baptism. Thus transformed, the Colossian converts must not be deceived by Gnosticism or whatever speculations had been enticing them away from the truth in whom the Deity dwells bodily and who overcame the powers of evil.

Today's Gospel is about prayer. Luke's version of the Lord's Prayer is shorter than the one commonly used in liturgies, Matthew's version. The ensuing parables show confident persistence like that of Abraham. Knock and it shall be opened, says Jesus, for God is the trustworthy Father.

July 25 was the feast of James the Greater, who with his brother John and Peter, formed Jesus' inner circle. He was beheaded by King Herod Agrippa in A.D. 44. A medieval legend holds that James went to Spain and that his body lies in Compostella, the pilgrimage site.



Dear Ones,

I don't generally look backwards as far as the calendar of saints' days is concerned, but I want to make an exception for Mary Magdalene, whose feast day was yesterday, July 22. Beyond her being the first person to witness the resurrected Jesus, and the woman most mentioned by name in the New Testament, after Mary the mother of Jesus, the scriptures don't tell us a great deal about Mary Magdalene.

Luke tells us that she was one of several women who, cured of various maladies, followed Jesus and the disciples, "helping to support them out of their own means" (Luke 8:3). The gospel writers never name male benefactors...I'm just saying.

But people tend to be uncomfortable with stories that have missing pieces. So, it was perhaps inevitable that Mary of Magdala became fused with Mary of Bethany, and the unnamed sinner in Luke 7. In 591 CE, Pope Gregory the Great solidified this misunderstanding in a sermon. Over time, in countless depictions, her hair became flowing, and wavy, and red.

Mary Magdalene is a beacon of hope for me in a time when the government of this country is aggressively seeking to turn back the clock on the status of women. Women who speak out against policies that harm others are quickly disparaged or demonized. Mary was the woman chosen to bring the good news of the resurrection to the disciples. Without her witness, and the witness of countless generations of women, you and I wouldn't be here. So, this week, let us remember and give thanks for Mary's "light and lovely" news! Here is Malcolm Guite's sonnet for the day.

Mary Magdalene

Men called you light so as to load you down,
And burden you with their own weight of sin,
A woman forced to cover and contain
Those seven devils sent by Everyman.
But one man set you free and took your part
One man knew and loved you to the core
The broken alabaster of your heart
Revealed to Him alone a hidden door,
Into a garden where the fountain sealed,
Could flow at last for him in healing tears,
Till, in another garden, he revealed
The perfect Love that cast out all your fears,
And quickened you with love's own sway and swing,
As light and lovely as the news you bring.


Vestry Meeting Summary July 14, 2025

The Vestry meeting on July 14, 2025, began with evening prayer at 5:36 PM, and the minutes from the previous meeting were unanimously approved. The Treasurer's report highlighted the

need to identify pledging patterns among members and the Junior Warden noted pending insurance adjustments related to tornado damages. Program updates included the stewardship committee's upcoming meeting to discuss campaign resources and themes, and the finalization of the job description for the Trinity Food Ministry (TFM) Manager. TFM aims to fill the Manager role by October 1st and is preparing for potential impacts from national budget cuts to SNAP and Medicaid. Vestry discussions also covered the possibility of printed name tags for members, rather than handwritten, and the scheduling of annual combined services.

The Senior Warden reported progress on retrieving a misdirected check from a bequest, while the Junior Warden updated on ongoing tornado damage repairs and plans for a permanent outdoor water fountain. The Rector's report included thanks to Deacon Diana Wheeler, Deacon Barbi Click, and Fr. Steve Wiessmann for their assistance during Deacon Harry's sabbatical; updates on the involvement of the DSA in Sunday Hot Lunch; updates on parishioners' housing situations; and the introduction of a debit card for the Rector's Discretionary Fund. Any parishioners wanting to make contributions can write checks payable to the fund, and anyone needing assistance should meet with Fr. Paul.

Fr. Paul will be on vacation from August 6 to 20, with the Rev. Anne Kelsey covering services in his absence. The Vestry decided to forego the August meeting due to Fr. Paul's vacation, with the next meeting scheduled for September 16th. The meeting concluded with a prayer at 6:22 PM.
