





The Gospel John 1:1-18

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.
People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him,

who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.") From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.


Prayer A, Expansive Language

Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker and of all.

Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through Jesus Christ our Savior; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.



Invitation to Holy Communion


The sacrament of Holy Communion is central to the Christian community. As Christ gave freely of himself, so the sacred meal in his name is also freely given. Rejoicing in the spirit of Christ's inclusive love, all are warmly invited to receive the bread and wine at the Supper of the Lord.

Following the direction of the ushers, come forward to the communion rail, where you may kneel or stand. If you wish to receive a blessing rather than communion, please indicate that desire by crossing your arms over your chest.


To receive the bread, your right palm on top of your left palm. *Gluten-free wafers are available*. Please assist us by crossing your right arm over your chest so we may serve you correctly. To receive the wine, please help guide the chalice to your lips. If you do not receive wine, you may touch the chalice when it is offered, or simply cross both arms after receiving the bread.

Due to our Diocesan health policy, we ask you not to dip your communion bread into the chalice (i.e., intinction). If you are not comfortable drinking directly from the chalice, you are welcome to receive just the bread; or you may touch the chalice when it comes to you.

If you are unable to come to the altar rail, notify an usher, and we will bring communion to you.

Notes for December 28, 2025, First Sunday after Christmas

As the natural daylight begins to increase after the solstice, so the new light of Christ brightens after Christmas. Today's collect asks that the One who shines the Light of the Incarnation will light that same brightness in our hearts, and will make it glow in our lives. Thoughts of **Light**Incarnate pervade readings as the church reflects on the significance of Christ's birth. The climax of that reflection will be the reading of the Prologue to John's Gospel, about the irruption of eternity's Light into time's shadows.

"As brightness Zion's vindication will go forth." Isaiah uses light as well as a cluster of other images —wedding garments, spring garden, new name, crowns— to celebrate Israel's redemption. This passage was originally rejoicing at the Jews' return to Zion from their exile in Babylon, about 500 B.C.

Verse 2 of Psalm 147, "the Lord rebuilds Jerusalem; he gathers the exiles," dates it at the same time as today's Isaiah reading. Its verses about snow, frost, and cold make it fit the beginning of winter. Its last lines, "[God] declares his statutes and his judgments to Israel. He has not done so to any nation" raise the topic of the Torah and Gentiles' relation to it, to be addressed in today's epistle.


The status of Gentiles, to whom God's Torah was not given, erupted into a major controversy in the Galatian Church when some there had insisted that Gentile male converts to Christianity must first be circumcised, *i.e.*, made into Jews, before they could be admitted to the church. Vehemently Paul opposed that provision, arguing that circumcision, like other rules of the Torah, was for Jews' earlier stage of salvation, but now is unnecessary for Gentiles who are people of faith. Just as adults no longer need a custodian, so God's adoptees no longer need the Torah. As a son of the Torah himself, Jesus had been circumcised and named on the eighth day after he was "born of a woman," an occasion to be observed by the church calendar on January 1.

"[God's] word runs very swiftly," and "He sends forth his word" sings today's Psalm. That Word was in the beginning, attests the prologue to John's Gospel, echoing Genesis 1 as well as psalms. That Word was made flesh in Jesus. The Light which Isaiah had glimpsed, the word of which psalmists had inklings, became a man. That assertion is the principal axiom of the Christian Faith. The light coming from that en-fleshed Word illuminates the world, testified John the Baptist, though the world prefers its own darkness. Those who receive the shining Word are, Paul would write, adopted as God's children. Bright as Moses' Torah is, it is outshined by the grace and truth of Jesus, who is the Light Incarnate.

On December 28, the church calendar commemorates "the Holy Innocents," the infant boys of Bethlehem, massacred by order of Herod the Great. Because the 28th is a Sunday this year, that Feast, Childermas, is transferred to Monday. Another martyr, Archbishop Thomas Becket, was murdered in Canterbury Cathedral by order of another King, Henry II, on December 29, 1170.





This Week's Core Value: Food – Anglo-Catholic Worship


